Bad things about Cutsyke

- Lack of facilities and activities for children
- Drugs
- Disturbing motorbikes
- Dog fouling and lack of poo bins
- Excessive litter • Lack of local bus service (public transport + school bus)
- Apathy • Sense of alienation and disillusionment with the council
- Open space occupied by travelers

(from within and from afar)

• Overall negative perception of Cutsyke

What could be done

Here are projects that people felt were needed:

- New play area near Cutsyke Crescent
- An initiative to improve gardens provision of support and advice
- Improvements to the park on Westfield Road side
- General neighbourhood co-ordination including increased police presence and reducing speeding bikes

TOP COMMENTS AND IDEAS ABOUT DIFFERENT ASPECTS OF CUTSYKE

- Better bus stops / new shelters • Stop the drug dealers
- More police surveillance we pay for it!
- The state of the roads needs help
